Veterans Memorial Island - Vero Beach

Veterans Memorial Island Sanctuary is located adjacent to Riverside Park on the Barrier Island, south of the Merrill Barber Bridge. Veterans Memorial Island Sanctuary is now a quiet haven for reflection on the sacrifices made by the Armed Forces of our Country. It contains memorials to the men and women of Indian River County who died in combat while defending our Country. This Island was purchased by the City of Vero Beach on May 5, 1947, and it was dedicated in the early 1960s as Memorial Island Park. In 2004, it was remodeled, and the name was changed to Veterans Memorial Island Sanctuary.

Based on true events, this film follows the lives of three female African American mathematicians who work at NASA during the 1960s space race. The trio overcomes obstacles and helps with the mission that makes John Glenn the first American to orbit the Earth.

Wildlife Resident Spotlight by Gail Reiss

The **Egyptian Goose** is a non-native bird that has found a home in Hidden Lakes with a nesting pair and their young. Egyptian geese are not really geese but a type of shelduck - a cross between a goose and a duck. They are native to Africa, particularly in the Nile River valley, and have been revered by ancient Egyptians for centuries. According to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, Egyptian Geese have been present in Florida since the 1960s. Originally introduced into Florida as "ornamental waterfowl" in suburban parks and zoos, escaped birds have now established permanent populations in city parks, golf course communities and suburban neighborhoods. These birds are striking in appearance, with a chestnut-brown body, a distinctive white wing patch, and black and white markings on their head and neck. They also have a unique call, a series of honks and cackles that can be heard from quite a distance. Egyptian Geese are social animals that form monogamous pairs, and can be found in small to large groups, often mingling with other waterfowl species. Here in Florida, the birds breed year-round. The geese nest on the ground but can also nest on top of trees and buildings.

"This Month In History" JULY

I799: French soldiers make a discovery that helps scholars decode Egyptian hieroglyphics. The Rosetta Stone—so named for the town near which it was found—includes the same text in Greek and Egyptian, providing the key necessary to unlock the meaning of the picture-based hieroglyphs.

1826: Former Presidents Thomas Jefferson and John Adams both die on the Fourth of July, half a century after each man signed the Declaration of Independence.

1847: The United States Post Office introduces the first postage stamps: a five-cent stamp featuring Benjamin

Franklin and a 10-cent stamp honoring George Washington.

1903: The Tour de France hosts its first race outside of Paris.

1955: Disneyland welcomes its first guests to "The Happiest Place on Earth" in Anaheim, Calif.

1969: Apollo 11, crewed with astronauts Neil Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins, lands on the moon.

1979: Sony reveals the first portable cassette player—the Walkman.

1985: More than a billion people tune in to watch Live Aid, a concert featuring stars including David Bowie, Bob Dylan, Elton John and Queen. The concert raised more than \$140 million for famine relief in Ethiopia.

2002: American businessman Steve Fossett becomes the first solo adventurer to fly around the world in a balloon without stopping.
